The employees at Coweta-Fayette EMC are looking to 2012 with optimism. Innovation is one of the key ingredients they will be using to serve you better in the New Year. For instance, an

enhanced voice over IP phone system is being added to provide additional functionality, redundancy, capacity and Member-friendly features that will provide even better service to our Members.

We are also making significant progress towards the completion of our GPS/GIS project. We are inspecting, inventorying, tagging and obtaining GPS coordinates at every pole, transformer and other major piece of electric distribution equipment. All of the data collected will be utilized in our mapping system, engineering software and customer service database.

When we conclude this GPS/GIS project in 2013, we will have the most up-to-date and accurate electronic mapping system currently available. All information will be accessible in our offices or remotely in the field. We will be able to interface our mapping system – using almost surveyor-like accuracy – with any geo-referenced ESRI shape file of roads, water and sewer lines, county property parcel maps and aerial photographs, just to name a few.

Also on the horizon, the Georgia General Assembly will convene and begin the legislative process in the first half of January. We wish them wisdom and courage in carrying out their responsibilities. Georgia is blessed to have many great leaders willing to make the hard, but necessary, decisions.

At the November 29 Newnan-Coweta Chamber of Commerce Eggs and Issues Early Bird Forum, I had the great pleasure of hearing State Rep. Lynn Smith update us on what we could expect in the upcoming 2012 legislative session. Rep. Hammett, who has worked tirelessly and quietly for his community and co-op over the decades, was nominated in the Employee of the Year category and honored as one of the top three volunteers among our state's EMC personnel.

Coweta-Fayette EMC Employees Honored for Heroics

Three Coweta-Fayette EMC workers were recently recognized by Georgia EMC for likely saving the life of a man who experienced health problems at the coop's headquarters building in October 2010.

For their heroic efforts, Dawn Hunter, Rusty Rainey and Darrell Sewell each received a prestigious Life Saving Award during the association's annual meeting in Atlanta November 14.

On the day of the incident, GRESCO Utility Service, Inc. representative Jason Chandler was visiting the EMC's Palmetto location on a sales call when he began to experience severe health problems. Hunter, Rainey and Sewell leaped to action, calling 911 and monitoring his vitals until an ambulance arrived.

Chandler was rushed to Piedmont Fayette Hospital, where he was diagnosed with a life-threatening saddle or bilateral pulmonary embolism, a blood clot in each lung. He believes the trio's prompt response probably saved his life.

"The employees at Coweta-Fayette EMC are a credit to their company and their community," says Chandler.

Spare Change Changes Lives

It's the little things that count in life – being kind to your neighbors, returning a lost wallet, picking up after yourself while enjoying the great outdoors. While each action may not amount to much alone, we see a big impact in our community when these small deeds are combined.

That's why Coweta-Fayette EMC is proud to offer Operation Round Up, a charitable campaign begun in 1989 by South Carolina's Palmetto Electric Cooperative and currently adopted by about 250 electric co-ops nationwide. Although initially created to help co-op members who could not pay housing, medical and utility bills, Operation Round Up programs at many EMCs began allocating monies to organizations that serve the community and are in the business of identifying need.

Since 1993, your cooperative's Operation Round Up program has been a successful one, contributing more than \$250,000 annually to worthy groups in the EMC service area. These awards were made possible by voluntary contributions from cooperative members whose monthly electric bills were "rounded up" to the nearest dollar. The difference between what was actually owed and the next highest dollar was placed in an interest-bearing account managed through a separate board of directors, the Coweta-Fayette EMC Trust.

One of our most popular Operation Round Up offshoots is "Bright Ideas," an educational grant program administered to schools and teachers for special projects outside the normal scope of every-day learning. This investment in education touches students' lives and helps schools struggling with ever-tighter budget constraints. After six years of Bright Ideas grants, along with the college and vocational scholarships also funded by Operation



Round Up, Coweta-Fayette EMC has awarded almost \$1 million to educational endeavors.

We would like to thank all of our generous members who participate in the Operation Round Up program. Without you, none of this would be possible.

As a result of your thoughtful donations, many charitable organizations have received much-needed assistance and countless individuals facing hardship in our community have been helped.

Funds from Operation Round Up have provided things like wheelchairs, voice-activated computers, wheelchair lifts, handicap accessible vans, a veterans' flight to Washington, D.C., box fans, food pantry items and pre-natal counseling, just to name a few. Winter Weather Safety

If caught outdoors:

- Try to find shelter.
- If no shelter is available: try to stay dry; cover all exposed body parts; and build a fire for heat and to attract attention.

If caught in your vehicle:

- Stay inside it.
- Run the motor about 10 minutes each hour for heat.
- Open the window a little for fresh air and to avoid carbon monoxide poisoning.
- Turn on the dome light at night to be visible to rescuers.
- Tie a colored cloth, preferably red, to your antenna or door
- After the snow stops, raise your hood to indicate help is needed.

- From time to time, move arms, legs, fingers and toes vigorously to keep blood circulating.
- Make sure the exhaust pipe is not blocked.

If indoors:

- Stay inside!
- When using an alternate heat source, such as a fireplace, wood stove or space heater, use fire safeguards and properly ventilate the area.
- If there is no heat: close off unused rooms; stuff towels and rags in cracks under doors; cover windows at night; eat and drink (Food provides body energy to produce heat. Water helps prevent dehydration.); and wear layers of loose-fitting, light-weight, warm clothing (Remove layers if needed to avoid overheating, perspiration and subsequent chills.).

Beware these dangers:

- Never use a generator, grill, camp stove or other gasoline-, propane- or charcoal-burning devices inside a home, garage, basement, crawlspace or partially enclosed area.
- Locate unit in a well-ventilated area to avoid carbon monoxide poisoning.

Remember others:

- Help people who require assistance, such as the elderly or those with disabilities.
- Check on your pets and make sure that their access to food and water is not blocked by snow, ice or other obstacles.

Printing and Engraving, Mount Vernon, the National Cathedral, Ford's Theater and Smithsonian and Holocaust Museums. Students will also visit memorials honoring Presidents Franklin Roosevelt, Jefferson and Lincoln, as well as World War II and the Vietnam and Korean Wars.
