As we close out 2024, we look forward to meeting you at this year's first-ever community meetings and of course at our annual membership meeting. This is also a time to update you on Coweta-Fayette EMC's activities and achievements this past year. Reflecting on our progress, we are consistently reminded of the strength and resilience of our community and the unwavering dedication of your EMC's Board of Directors and employees.

Remaining a Low-Cost Energy Provider

In a year marked by economic challenges, Coweta-Fayette EMC has remained steadfast in our commitment to providing you with affordable energy. With rising inflation and the results of our study of the costs to serve each member, it was necessary to increase our rates for the first time since 2007. However, our rates still remain lower than those of the investor-owned and many municipal systems in our service area. In fact, Coweta-Fayette EMC members using 1,000 kWh or more each month pay over \$0.04 cents less per kWh than Georgia Power customers. This has been possible through the financial management of your Board, strategic planning, effective hedging programs, and long-term power agreements.

Providing Reliable Electric Services

Reliability remains a cornerstone of our mission. Our dedicated team of linemen and support staff work tirelessly to ensure that your homes and businesses remain powered, even in the face of severe weather and other challenges. Advanced technologies and robust protocols have further strengthened our ability to respond swiftly and effectively to outages. In addition, the approval of our new 3-year work plan means many of our service areas will see upgraded lines and the integration of more devices that allow us to segment lines, offering the ability to feed electricity from different locations in times of outages, reducing the amount of time our members are without power.

This year, we have faced new federal regulations that impact both coal and natural gas plants, potentially affecting the availability and affordability of electricity. We continue to advocate for balanced, common-sense approaches that consider both environmental goals and the need for reliable power. The successful integration of Plant Vogtle Unit 3, in 2023, and Unit 4, in 2024, into our energy portfolio are key drivers. These new units will enhance the

stability and reliability of our power supply and provide carbon-free energy for decades to come.

Community Focus

Our deep-rooted commitment to the community is reflected in every aspect of our

operations. Our employees and board members live and work in the service area, and this local presence drives our dedication to community well-being. In the first half of this year, your Operation Round Up (ORU) program awarded a total of \$88,920 to local charities, including Newnan-Coweta Habitat for Humanity, the Atlanta Community Food Bank, Bloom Your Youth, and Fayette Senior Services, among others. We also supported local law enforcement with grants for advanced search and rescue drone technology.

The Washington Youth Tour and our scholarship programs have continued to support and inspire the next generation of leaders. We are proud to have sponsored outstanding students on the Washington Youth Tour and awarded \$60,000 in scholarships to 30 deserving students.

Looking Ahead

As we move into 2025, we are mindful of the ongoing challenges and opportunities. We will continue to manage costs, advocate for common sense energy policy, and continue to innovate and explore new technology and solutions in order to provide you with the most reliable and affordable electric service.

We also look forward to enhancing our community engagement through programs and events like ORU and our Community Member Engagement Events. We will continue to support and promote our future leaders through scholarships and programs like the Washington Youth Tour.




Other States' Prices
